

How to Use A Font You've Uploaded

HOW TO CALL UP GOOGLE FONTS

Google is helpful with this. They write the code for you. All you have to do is choose your font(s):

`http://fonts.google.com`

Then, there will be a gray box at the bottom of the page. Click to expand it, and there are instructions for using the fonts with automatically generated code. I use the `@import` command:

```
@import "https://fonts.googleapis.com/css?family=Allura|Raleway";
```

HOW TO CALL IN A FONT YOU'VE UPLOADED

```
@font-face {  
    font-family: ADELE;  
    src: url(ADELE-Light.ttf);  
}
```

THEN, YOU CAN USE YOUR FONT LIKE THIS IN THE SAME CSS WINDOW:

```
.genesis-nav-menu a {  
    font-family: ADELE, Helvetica, Arial, sans-serif;  
    color: #333;  
    font-size: 18px;  
    font-weight: normal;  
    letter-spacing: 1px;  
    padding: 15px;  
}
```



Hiding Pinnable Images

Just add this snippet of code to your CSS:

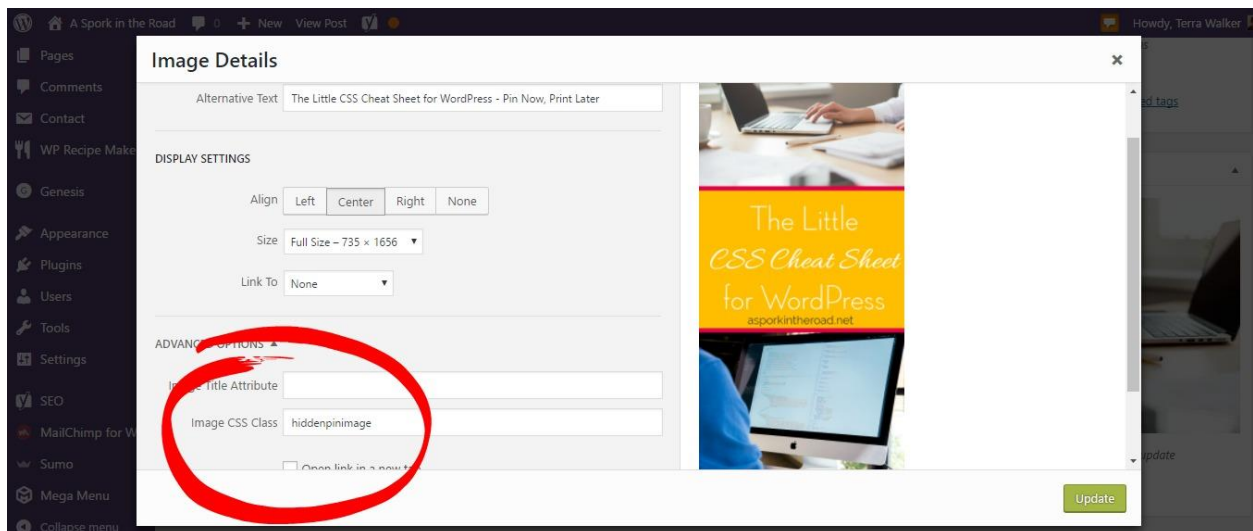

Then, when you're in your picture editor screen, add hiddenpinimage to the image CSS class area of the editor .hidden-pinnable-image-wordpress

You don't have to call it hiddenpinimage. You can call it Bob, or Brad (like your favorite car), or Wenceslas. It only matters that what you put in the CSS Class space and what you call your CSS class is the same - so call it something you'll remember forever.



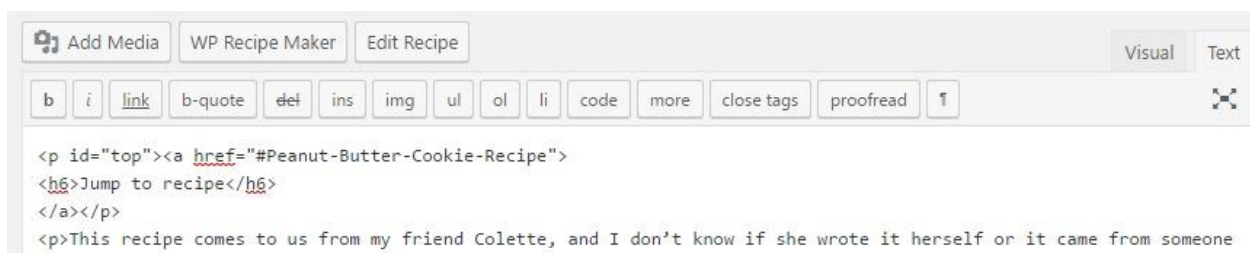
Creating Jump Links

You may find that your site traffic is better if you create jump links for readers who only want to get the meat and potatoes of your posts. For me, this is often true of my recipe posts, though I occasionally use jump links for posts like this.

You will need to be in your text editor on your post, and it needs to be the very last thing you do before you save, because WordPress will delete the code you've just added, as it often does.

Link Code

```
<p id="top"><a href="#your-link-name"> <h6>Jump to recipe</h6></a></p>
```



Target Text

```
<a name="unique-name">Target Text</a>
```

```
<a name="unique-name"></a> - to add the link to an area without adding text
```

```
<p id="unique-identifier">I am the target text.</p> - you can also add it to a paragraph designator
```

AND getting back to the top:

```
<div id="top"></div> or add the ID to the first header <h1 id="top">Page Heading</h1>
```

```
<a href="#top">back to top</a>
```
